CBS News. Trial at Nuremberg. New York: Franklin Watts, 1967.

Describes preparations for the International Military Tribunal at Nuremberg, introduces the twenty-four Nazis indicted, examines the case put forward by the prosecution and the inadequate response of the defense, and notes the verdict and sentence charged to each defendant.

Adler, David A. We Remember the Holocaust. New York: Scholastic Inc., 1989.

Discusses the events of the Holocaust and includes personal accounts from survivors of their experiences of the persecution and the death camps.

Anne Frank House. Anne Frank in the World: 1929-1945. New York: Scholastic Inc., 1985.

Contains twelve essays by a variety of authors in which they discuss and reflect upon the significance of Anne Frank and the diary she kept during the two years she spent in hiding from the Nazis during World War II.

Bachrach, Susan D. Tell Them We Remember: the Story of the Holocaust. Boston, MA: Little, 1994.

Describes how the lives of innocent people throughout Europe were affected by the tragedy of the Holocaust.

Presents excerpts from the diaries of five Jewish teenagers who were part of the millions of men, women, and children who died under Hitler's Nazi regime during World War II.

Chaikin, Miriam. A Nightmare in History: the Holocaust, 1933-1945. New York: Clarion Books, 1987.

Traces the history of anti-Semitism from biblical times through the twelve years of the Nazi era, 1933-1945, and describes Hitler's plans to annihilate European Jews by focusing on the Warsaw Ghetto and the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camps. Also discusses the continuing effort to remember the horrors of the Holocaust.

Drucker, Olga Levy. Kindertransport. New York: Henry Holt, 1992.

The author describes the circumstances in Germany after Hitler came to power that led to the evacuation of many Jewish children to England and her experiences as a young girl in England during World War II.

Personal narratives of Christians, Gypsies, deaf people, homosexuals, and blacks who suffered at the hands of the Nazis before and during World War II.

Goldsmith, Martin. The Inextinguishable Symphony: a True Story of Music and Love in Nazi Germany. New York: John Wiley & Sons, Inc., 2000.

Chronicles the true story of two Jewish musicians, Gunther Goldschmidt and Rosemarie Gumpert, who struggled against impossible odds to perform in Nazi Germany and found themselves falling in love.

Greenfeld, Howard. After the Holocaust. New York: Scholastic Inc., 2001.

Chronicles the harrowing experiences of eight orphaned and homeless young adults as they make their way from Displaced Persons camps to new lives in new countries.

Having escaped from an eastern European concentration camp where he has spent most of his life, a twelve-year-old boy struggles to cope with an entirely strange world as he flees northward to freedom in Denmark.

In an attempt to save his daughter's life, Eva's father sends her from Poland to a labor camp in Czechoslovakia where she and her sister survive the war.

Recounts the adventures of a nine-year-old Jewish girl and her family in the early 1930s as they travel from Germany to England, when she realizes that staying together as a family was more important than the hardships or poverty they faced.

Lowry, Lois. Number the Stars. New York: Yearling Books, 1989.

In 1943, during the German occupation of Denmark, ten-year-old Annemarie learns how to be brave and courageous when she helps shelter her Jewish friend from the Nazis.

Matas, Carol. Daniel's Story. New York: Scholastic, 1993.

Daniel, whose family suffers as the Nazis rise to power in Germany, describes his imprisonment in a concentration camp and his eventual liberation.

After being released from Buchenwald at the end of World War II, fifteen-year-old Ruth risks her life to lead a group of children across Europe to Palestine.

Anna, a teenaged German refugee, relates how she and other Jewish children were cared for by the citizens of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon, France, during the German occupation.

During the Nazi occupation of Denmark, Lisa and other teenage Jews become involved in an underground resistance movement and eventually must flee for their lives.

Living on the outskirts of the Warsaw Ghetto during World War II, fourteen-year-old Marek and his grandparents shelter a Jewish man in the days before the Jewish uprising.

Orlev, Uri. The Island on Bird Street. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1983.

During World War II a Jewish boy is left on his own for months in a ruined house in the Warsaw Ghetto, where he must learn all the tricks of survival under constantly life-threatening conditions.

Propp, Vera W. When the Soldiers Were Gone. New York: Putnam, 1999.

After the German occupation of the Netherlands, Benjamin leaves the Christian family with whom he had been living and reunites with his real parents who returned from hiding. Based on a true story.

Richter, Hans Peter. Friedrich. New York: Puffin Books, 1970.

A young German boy recounts the fate of his best friend, a Jew, during the Nazi regime.

Sachs, Marilyn. A Pocket Full of Seeds. New York: Puffin Books, 1994.

During World War II in occupied France, a young Jewish girl returns from an overnight visit to find her family has disappeared.

Serrailier, Ian. Escape from Warsaw. New York: Scholastic, 1992.

During 1942 in Warsaw, Edek shoots a Nazi storm trooper. Edek and his two sisters must escape from the secret police.

Spinelli, Jerry. Milkweed: a Novel. New York: Scholastic Inc., 2003.

The author takes us to one of the most devastating settings imaginable – Nazi-occupied Warsaw – and tells a tale of heartbreak, hope, and survival through the bright eyes of a young orphan living on the street.

Vos, Ida. Anna Is Still Here. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1993.

Thirteen-year-old Anna, who was a "hidden child" in Nazi-occupied Holland during World War II, gradually learns to deal with the realities of being a survivor.

Vos, Ida. Hide and Seek. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1999.

A young Jewish girl living in Holland tells of her experiences during the Nazi occupation, her years in hiding, and the aftershock when the war finally ends.

Vos, Ida. The Key is Lost. New York: Scholastic Inc., 2000.

When the Germans occupy Holland in 1940 and begin to persecute the Jews there, twelve-year-old Eva and her family assume false names and move from one hiding place to another.

Ten-year-old Korinna must decide whether to report her parents to her Hitler youth group when she discovers that they are hiding Jews in a secret space behind Korinna's bedroom wall.

Winter, Kathryn. Katarina: A Novel. New York: Scholastic, 1998.

During World War II in Slovakia, a young Jewish girl in hiding becomes a devout Catholic and is sustained by her belief that she will return home to her family as soon as the war ends.

Yolen, Jane. The Devil's Arithmetic. New York: Puffin Books, 1988.

Hannah resents the traditions of her Jewish heritage until time travels places her in the middle of a small Jewish village in Nazi-occupied Poland.
